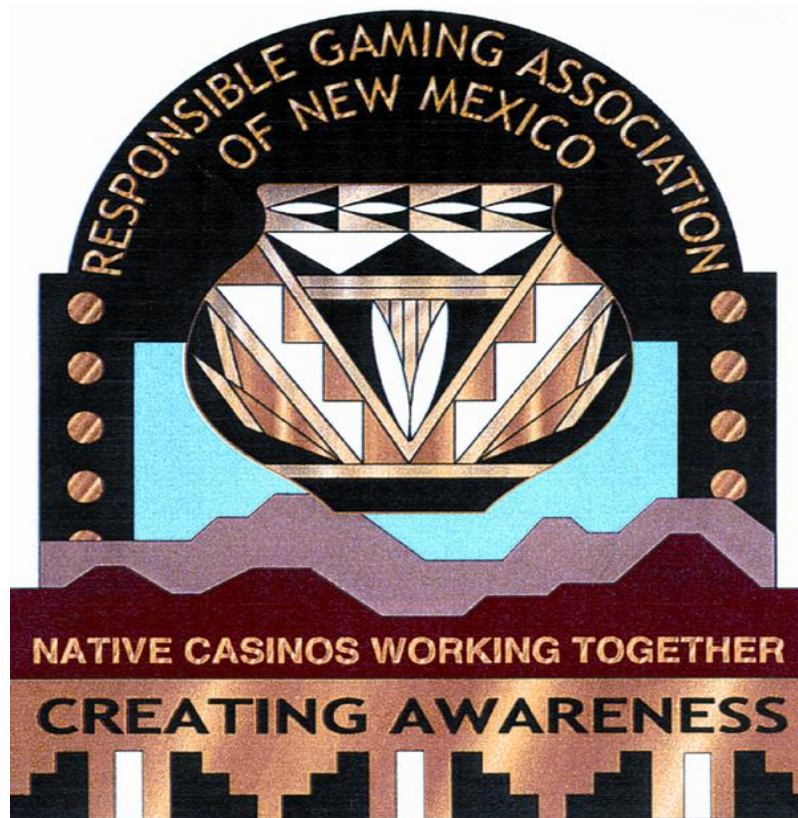

- Annual training for all our membership casino personnel on problem gambling and responsible gaming.
- Funding for treatment and prevention initiatives.

It is important that we keep abreast of other states' efforts and best practices in order to provide quality outreach and education. We are proud to be able to provide that same opportunity to you.

The 23rd Annual Conference on Problem Gambling - a gathering of therapists and preventionists from around New Mexico and the Southwest to hear from experts in the fields of research, treatment, and prevention.

This year is an opportunity to learn about new research being done in New Mexico looking at the prevalence of problem gambling, findings that inform our practices as therapists and preventionists. We will learn new information about the neurobiology of gambling disorder, the impact of adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) in New Mexico, what that means for tailoring our approaches, strategic family therapy for gambling problems, and Prodependence, a new way of viewing partners of gambling addicts, and how we regard them, treat them, and support them as they bravely navigate holding their partnerships and families together in the wake of addictive illness.

Day One: ACEs, Adverse Childhood Experiences; how research is isolating ACEs factors for understanding how to treat, prevent, and evolve our approach to addiction as an illness.

Casino games; how they work, debunking myths, looking at how a game might be a metaphor or an indicator for what a problem gambler is seeking in their escape fantasy.

Day Two: A gaming addict's personal experience and description of the way to recovery, the neurobiology of problem gambling, strategic family therapy with families impacted by problem gambling, and Prodependence: Moving beyond Codependency.

Speaker Bios and Session Descriptions:

Cam Adair is the founder of Game Quitters, the world's largest support community for video game addiction, serving members in 95 countries. Named one of Canada's top 150 leaders in Mental Health, his work has been published in *Psychiatry Research*, and featured in two TEDx talks, *Forbes*, *BBC*, the *New York Times*, *NPR*, *CNN*, and *ABC 20/20*, amongst others. He's an internationally recognized speaker, entrepreneur, and YouTuber with over 2M views. Born in Canada, he currently lives in California.

Rebecca Beardsley Rebecca Beardsley is the Training Manager at Santa Ana Star Casino Hotel and is serving as President of the Responsible Gaming Association of New Mexico (RGANM), for the sixth consecutive year. She has over 20 years of experience in health care and addiction; heading up an indigent fund, DWI program and working for a community hospital. These roles included, but were not limited to, networking with community and state leaders, identifying and contracting for resources, and coordinating and executing prevention/community outreach efforts. This has benefitted her, during her more than 10 years in casino gaming, by setting the foundation to play a more proactive role with casino employees, be a resource to other communities/states and be successful in her leadership role in the RGANM.

Dan Best, LPCC LMFT, Family therapist, teacher, clinical supervisor, and trainer, Dan Best received over a decade of supervision in family therapy early in his thirty-year career. He is delighted to pass on to you the depth of healing that can take place by engaging the family system. An exploration of how gambling addiction affects family dynamics and how family dynamics can be used to recover and heal from gambling addiction. Family therapy is a powerful modality in treating problem gambling. Here's how.

Kristopher M. Goodrich, Ph.D. is a Department Chair and Associate Professor of Counselor Education at the University of New Mexico. He completed his graduate education in the CACREP accredited counseling program at Syracuse University. Dr. Goodrich has written 52 peer reviewed journal articles, co-authored or co-edited 3 books, and has contributed 20 pieces to other publications. He is the current editor of the *Journal for Specialists in Group Work*, a Past President of the Association for Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender Issues in Counseling (2015-2016), Past President of the New Mexico Counseling Association (2018-2019), Past President of the Rocky Mountain Association for Counselor Education and Supervision (RMACES), and the current President of the Association for Counselor Education and Supervision (ACES; 2019-2020).

Frank KROS M.A. JD, is a career child advocate, who has served as a childcare worker, child abuse investigator, children's home administrator, consultant, college professor, attorney, writer and speaker. Frank currently serves as president of the Transformation Education Institute (formerly The Upside Down Organization), Director of the National At-Risk Education Network (NAREN) and Executive Vice President of the TranZed Alliance, a multi-service children's organization headquartered in Maryland.

Dr. T. Celeste Napier is a Professor in the Departments of Pharmacology and Psychiatry at Rush University Medical Center, where she also is the Director for the Center for Compulsive Behavior and Addiction. Her scientific interests include the neuroscience of motivational behaviors, including those that regulate healthy decision-making versus those associated with drug and behavioral addictions. Her work also encompasses addiction co-morbidity with other mental and neurological diseases. She has over 200 publications in on topics that span molecular biology, biochemistry, neurophysiology and behavior. Her research directly translates into medication development for mental health disorders. She has provided expert testimony to the US Congress Committee on Science, Space and Technology Subcommittee on Research and Technology, and to Illinois House of Representatives, Heroin and Youth Task Force Hearing.

James Abeyta Stevens is the Director of Human Resources at the Santa Ana Star Casino Hotel and is also a Licensed Mental Health Counselor. He has worked in the casino industry for 17 years and has worked with both casino guests and employees regarding responsible gaming and gambling addiction. James uses a holistic approach in HR and counseling centered around reviving the human spirit and motivating individuals to meet and exceed their potential. This connection includes the integration of resilience, awareness and wellness approaches to both healing and relationships building.
